BCMM appoints City Manager

he Buffalo City Metropolitan Council embarked on a recruitment process to fill the vacant City Manager's post on 30 September 2011. A total of thirty-nine (39) applicants applied for the post. Six (6) applicants were eliminated and two (2) withdrew their applications. Only six (6) candidates were shortlisted and five (5) were interviewed (after one of them withdrew).

The recruitment panel approved by Council on the 29th November 2011, comprised of councilors from the African National Congress and the Democratic Alliance, representatives from the provincial government and union members from SAMWU and IMATU as observers.

After a selection and interview process that included a preliminary vetting, independent data check, psychometric test conducted by PriceWaterHouseCoopers, and presentations by the short-listed candidates, the panel unanimously recommended to the Executive Mayor and to Council, the appointment of Mr. Andile Fani.

On the 27th February 2012, the Buffalo City Metropolitan Council resolved to approve the appointment of Mr. Andile Fani in the capacity of City Manager for a fixed term period of five (5) years, with effect from 1 March 2012.

It therefore, gives me great pleasure to announce to the community of Buffalo City Metropolitan Municipality, the appointment of Mr. Andile Fani as the City Manager.

Italians donate truck to BCMM farmers

n an effort to strength ties with the Buffalo City Metropolitan Municipality, the Province of Grosseto recently donated a delivery truck to the value of R250 000 to agricultural cooperatives operating in Mdantsane unit 18. Speaking at the hand over, BCMM Executive Mayor Zukiswa Ncitha said: "We feel honored to be partners with the Tuscany government and would like to thank the efforts that they are putting with the Buffalo City Metropolitan Municipality," said Ncitha.

She added that the donation the Italians will help improve the lives of the people of Mdantsane. Fabio Fabbri, from the Grosseto Province, said the partnership with BCMM seeks to ensure that agricultural cooperatives are capacitated with technical and management skills.

Buffalo City Metro through NETSAFRICA forged partnership with the Italian Province of Tuscany which provides technical expertise and financial support to hydroponics farming in Mdantsane.

The programme's approach to the concept of urban agriculture was informed by the need to ensure that people had a sustainable food basket at their doorstep, and to encourage the emergence of market-orientated business entities. The pilot project began in NU6 in Mdantsane, with three co-operatives benefiting. Some members of the co-operatives received training from the Italian partners in various aspects of urban agriculture, and tomatoes were the first product grown in the tunnels.

German City helps needy children by Tabisa Mintengwana

TRUCK by the plight of vulnerable children during a visit to Buffalo City, the mayor of a German town has sent some cheer down south.

In an effort to improve the children's living conditions, the city of Oldenburg has donated more than R9 000 to the East London Child and Youth Care Centre.

The donation came after the mayor, Gerd Schwadner, visited the centre in 2011. He toured the home with German volunteers who are working at the facility, where they help the children with their schoolwork and reading lessons.

"During their visit, the delegates noticed the plight of the orphans and vulnerable children and decided to raise funds in Oldenburg through selling cupcakes," explained Darby Gounden, the City's manager of development co-operation and international relations.

An amount of R9 700 was raised at the cake sale. Earlier this year, Executive Mayor Zukiswa Ncitha travelled to Germany in to discuss a city-to-city partnership with the City of Oldenburg. Schwadner entrusted his Buffalo City counterpart with the handing over of the funds to the facility, which she did at the East London City Hall last week.

Speaking at the event, Ncitha said: "The City is grateful to have such ties with foreign countries. For us, this is a lesson that we need to have the same ability as the youth and people of other countries where we would help others without expecting anything in return." She added that this gesture meant a lot to the people of East London. The centre houses over 100 street children, abandoned children and children affected by HIV and Aids. Its Glen Stella Campus was recently refurbished by the youth of Leiden, the metro's Dutch sister city. The boys unit now has three bedrooms, two bathrooms and an en-suite room for one childcare worker. It also has a kitchen and a lounge.

Sexwale opens multi-storey Southernwood Square

he Minister of human Settlement Tokyo Sexwale launched a nine storey Southernwood Square Social Housing project in a bid to address housing needs of low income earners in East London on February 14.

Southernwood Square consists of 57 bachelor flats, 78 one bedroom flats and 114 two bedroom flats. The project caters for households earning between R2 500 to R7 500 per month.

Speaking at the launch, Minister Sexwale said the provision of medium to high density housing projects is one of the main solutions in dealing with the housing needs in urban areas.

"For us to make a difference in the lives of people who fall within the GAP market (those who earn too much to qualify for free government subsidy but also earn too little to apply for housing finance from banks) we need to have more of these projects," he told hundreds of community members at the launch.

The project is spearheaded by the Department of Human Settlements and is managed by Own Haven through the funding from Provincial Department of Human Settlement and National Housing Finance Corporation (NHFC). BCMM Portfolio head for Human Settlement Nomiki Mgezi said the Metro has submitted an application for Level two accreditation status to the national minister of Human settlement for approval.

"With such accreditation the metro will be able to speed up the delivery of houses and in the process eradicating informal settlement."

Level two accreditation status gives municipalities the responsibility to approve and manage housing construction programmes and ensure and technical quality assurance.

Currently, this authority rested primarily with Provincial Government of Human Settlement.

In reply to the request by Cllr Mgezi, Minister Sexwale said his office will look at the application submitted by the metro.

"With the authority to take such decisions, it is imperative for the

municipality to beef up its capacity in order to manage this huge task. During the launch some residents demonstrated their dissatisfaction on what they called structural defects of some units. Sexwale addressed this group explaining that they had a right to voice their dissatisfaction.

"Clients must be satisfied, that is why we are here, to listen and find out how they feel about this development. You must also highlight the positives, you must tell us about the good things that are happening here as well".

Sexwale also encouraged tenants to pay rent for their units. "Things don't come for free. People must keep paying rent. Government has a responsibility to provide human settlements as much as tenants have a responsibility to pay for rent," he said.

BCMM clamps down on illegal signs

n an effort to curb erecting of offensive signs in the City, Buffalo City Metropolitan Municipality Law enforcement Services confiscated thousands of illegal posters and flyers last week.

This came after the Metro noticed a disturbing trend in which people are publicly erecting offensive signs, posters and notices illegally. In response to this problem, BCMM initiated a law enforcement campaign against the display of illegal and undesirable posters especially in the CBD area.

BCMM General Manager for Public Safety Steve Terwin said the Law Enforcement Unit conducted a raid to premises of eight socalled healers in Gladstone Street at East London the CBD area.

"During the raid, numerous advertising boards that were erected in contravention of the municipal by-law were impounded and approximately 30 000 posters, flyers and pamphlets were also impounded. We issued a total of 16 summonses (R1600 per person)

to various individuals for illegally displaying posters," said Terwin.

According to BCMM Signage Control Section these illegal signs are erected in inappropriate places like street verandas, traffic control signal / busy intersections, walls, rocks, bins, trees etc. Some contain offensive material, tend to obstruct traffic in such streets or pollute the environment. For any illegal poster that has been erected, the Municipality will remove such poster(s)

at a cost of R160.00 each per un pasted poster, and R395.00 each per pasted poster if such poster(s) has not been removed after the Municipality has written to the offender giving him notice remove such poster(s).

The erection of illegal signage hampers the municipality efforts to keep the City clean. The municipality is calling upon residents to take pride and responsibility in their environment and discourage these people who are spreading filth in the city.

Buffalo City Metro Communications Department embarked on a four day public engagement session from 20-23 of February to afford city residents an opportunity to vote for the new logo.


This follows after the metro engaged the public and stakeholders on the elements of the new logo for the municipality.

BCMM introduce ward based planning system

n an effort to encourage local people to be part of municipal planning process, Buffalo City Metropolitan Municipality Public Participation Department has started with the process of establishing ward based planning system.

The objective of this initiative is to empower local communities to play an active role in the development of their area. It is being implemented by Buffalo City metro with the assistance from NETSAFRICA and the Department of Co-operative Governance and Traditional Affairs.

Buffalo City Metro Public Participation Manager Kwenzi Ngoma said this community -based planning process will provide a link between municipal planning, service delivery and activities at ward level.

"In partnership with the community in each ward, we will identify two local people that will participate in the ward based planning system. As part of the initiative, ward committee members, community development workers, community development facilitators and other role players will be trained in participatory methods, business plan development and capacity to respond effectively to the needs and priorities of the their respective areas."

Ngoma added that: "Ward based planning will identify communities' key projects for which business plans will be developed in order to get funds to implement them within a stipulated period.

The Municipality owns the municipal-level phase, providing some resources to the wards and managing the planning process. The ward committee manages the community process and monitors the implementation of the ward plans and decisions taken by the community. Throughout the country, various municipalities including Mangaung Metropolitan Municipality have started introducing a ward-planning system.


